Cal Poly Fall Enrollment Applications Sets Another Record

Cal Poly received a record number of applications with nearly 57,000 first-time freshmen and transfer students seeking to enroll for the 2016-17 school year. It was the largest undergraduate applicant pool in Cal Poly history with 48,215 first-time freshmen and 8,553 upper division transfers submitting on-time applications. It was a 2.8 percent increase from the 46,897 incoming freshmen who applied in 2014 and a 7.7 percent rise in the number of transfer students who applied. Acceptance decisions should be announced prior to the April 1 national acknowledgment date. Fall classes begin Sept. 22. The CSU also received a record number of applications for fall enrollment. It was the sixth consecutive record enrollment for the CSU.

Campus to Host Feb. 4 Debate for 24th Congressional Candidates

Five candidates seeking to represent the Central Coast in the U.S. Congress will discuss their priorities and the major issues facing local constituents and the nation in a debate from 6-8 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 4, in the Spanos Theatre. KCBX FM News Director Randol White will moderate discussion between Assemblyman Katcho Achadjian, Santa Barbara County Supervisor Salud Carbajal, Pro Band Sports Industries Vice President Justin Fareed, Citizens Congress Director Bill Ostrander, and Santa Barbara Mayor Helene Schneider. Individuals who have recently requested paperwork to file for candidacy have also been invited to participate. The candidates will address the federal government's role in higher education, economic growth and prosperity, environmental sustainability and water policy, and social divisions including political polarization. Audience members will also have the opportunity to submit questions about issues not covered in the main discussion. Cal Poly to Host Talk on Enhancement Technologies and Disabilities Jan. 22

Virginia Tech philosophy Professor Ashley Shew will present "We Can Rebuild You: Disabled Bodies and Technological Imagination" at 11 a.m. Friday, Jan. 22, in Philips Hall in the Performing Arts Center. Shew will discuss how technology developed for the disabled has been adapted for the able-bodied. For instance, exoskeletons developed to help paralysed people walk have been adapted to help workers and soldiers lift and carry heavy equipment over distances. News reports suggest that bionic technologies, including wearables and implantables, are set to radically alter life in the near future. Shew, a recent amputee, will contrast disabled people in the media against the reality of actual, lived experiences. The event is free and open to the public.
